1: Sorry, we don't serve your kind here. 2: Whites only! 3: You cannot use that drinking fountain! 4: But... All: Sorry! 5-8: You can't go to our school. 9: Stop! Your restroom is down there. 10: Oh. Sorry. 11: What are you all talking about? 12: Don't you know that life used to be different for African Americans in the United States? 13: What do you mean? 14: How was it different? 15: Blacks and whites were segregated. 13, 14: Segregated? All: Segregated. [sound effect] 4: Yes, they were separated. All: Segregation is the social policy of separation according to race. 5: Whites had more rights? [gesture] All: Right! [gesture] 6: Blacks and whites used different restaurants, 6, 7: drinking fountains, 6-8: schools. 6-9: and restrooms. 10: And even though they paid the same fare, blacks had to sit in All: [sound effect] the back of the bus! 16: Man, why'd anybody put up with that? All: Jim Crow! [gesture] [sound effect] 17: Who's Jim Crow? 18: Jim Crow is an insulting slang term for a black person. All: The laws that permitted segregation were called Jim Crow laws. 19: Jim Crow laws denied blacks civil rights like sitting at the front of the bus. 13, 14: Civil rights? What are they? All: Civil rights are the fundamental freedoms and privileges belonging to a country's citizens. 20: All citizens!

1: In the 1950's and 1960', civil rights came to mean the movement to secure equal opportunity and treatment for members of minority groups.

2: Equal job opportunities,

- 4: equal schools.
- 5: And no more moving to
- All: [sound effect] the back of the bus!
- 6: Ummm-hmmmm. [gesture] Thanks to
- All: Rosa Parks! [gesture] [sound effect]

7: Who's Rosa Parks?

8: She's a black woman who was riding on a bus in Montgomery, Alabama, in 1955.

9: A bunch of white people got on, and the bus driver said,

10: "Y'all move to the back now and give these people your seats!"

- 11: And Rosa Parks
- All: Refused! [gesture] [sound effect]
- 12: She was even arrested for this.
- 13, 14: Arrested?
- All: Arrested! [gesture] [sound effect]
- 15: And then what happened?

16: Word got out, and all of Montgomery began the famous bus boycott.

17: Black people refused to ride any bus

anywhere if the bus segregation law was not changed.

- 18: It took over a year, but the boycott worked!
- All: [sound effect]

19: And Rosa Parks is credited with initiating the modern Civil Rights movement.

20: Thanks to Rosa Parks and others...

1: we all have the right to use the same restaurants,

1-5: drinking fountains,

1-10: schools,

1-20: and restrooms.

2: And never again will blacks be forced to move to

All: [sound effect] the back of the bus!

3: And that, fellow citizens, was just the start of the

All: condemnation of segregation! [gesture] [sound effect]

1: When Sarah Knight visited New York, the
